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Letter from our President and Founder, Aleta Margolis

At <u>Center for Inspired Teaching</u>, we fueled curiosity and critical thinking for teachers and students, infused joy into teaching and learning, and **created classroom environments where** <u>everyone</u> **can thrive**.

Here are some program highlights:

- The <u>Teaching with Improvisation Fellowship</u>, with support from the DC Commission on Arts and Humanities, kicked off with an intensive hands-on, whole-body Institute. 32 teachers from Washington, DC schools-<u>plus one from</u> <u>Ukraine</u>-were selected from a record number of applicants to begin a year of professional learning, growth, and joy. These Fellows joined teachers from last year's cohort in bringing Inspired Teaching to hundreds of teachers in dozens of schools across DC.
- Thousands of educators in DC and beyond connected with the <u>Inspired</u> <u>Teaching Approach</u> through <u>school and district partnerships</u>; our alwaysgrowing, always-accessible <u>library of digital resources</u>; twice-monthly <u>professional development Institutes</u>; weekly <u>Hooray For Monday</u> publication and podcast; and contributed articles in <u>leading education magazines</u>.
- Students from 21 high schools in Washington, DC and from schools across the country expanded their empathy and strengthened their communication and critical thinking skills during monthly <u>Speak Truth</u> sessions-vital lessons ahead of the 2024 Election.
- We continued to innovate new ways for educators to access our resources. From our robust <u>online library of activities and strategies</u> to disseminating the <u>ABCDE of Learner Needs</u>, Inspired Teaching tools are available for use in more classrooms than ever before.

Inspired Teaching will continue to offer opportunities for professional learning through play, guidance for navigating uncertainty, and community for all who wish to transform the education experience for teachers and students.

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Meeting the Needs of Teachers & Students

Our professional learning programming reached 10,000 teachers and school leaders, including **4,380 from the DMV**.

In the ongoing wake of the pandemic, students' social-emotional learning took center stage, as did the well-being of teachers. Inspired Teaching was ready to support educators in their efforts to build resilience and bolster school connectedness while meeting academic standards.

At the outset of the 2023-2024 school year, Inspired Teaching published the <u>ABCDE of</u> <u>Learner Needs</u> Guidebooks. These digital resources-including one for K-12 educators and one for early childhood educatorswere a focal point of all Inspired Teaching programming.

From monthly <u>Inspired Teaching Institutes</u> –interactive and engaging professional development workshops–to the <u>Teaching</u> <u>with Improvisation Fellowship</u> and <u>our</u> <u>work within schools and districts</u>, we provided teachers with tools and strategies for identifying and addressing core learner needs. We also took care of the teachers themselves. Thousands of teachers in Washington, DC and around the world are equipped to create classrooms where everyone can thrive.

Inspired Teaching continued our partnership with Rapphannock County, VA Public Schools, training a team of preK-12 Teacher Leaders to build curiosity and critical thinking, and equipping them to spread the Inspired Teaching Approach district-wide.

Inspired Teaching's youth programs –Speak Truth and Real World History–continued the work of showcasing what the <u>Inspired Teaching Approach</u> looks like in action.

Students participated in <u>Speak Truth</u> sessions online and inperson, at libraries and in classrooms around Washington, DC. <u>Students tackled an array of topics they identified as</u> <u>important and relevant to themselves</u>, including school safety, consumerism, and prison reform.

<u>Real World History</u> students honed their skills as historians, *learning by doing*, as they connected with Washington, DC elders for oral histories of the Great Migration and interning at cultural institutions around the District, like the <u>Smithsonian Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage</u> and the <u>Advisory Council on Historic Preservation</u>.

Real World History student Makayla Napper hosted an Instagram "takeover" as an intern at the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation.

Speak Truth America

High school students from states across the country gathered for a **Speak Truth America** discussion at George Washington University. Attendees hailed from Montana, Missouri, Georgia, Washington, Idaho, North Dakota, California, and Oregon and they came together to discuss their reactions to the film **The First Step**, which documents a rare story about cross-party coalition building.








Spreading the Word

Other new tools created in SY 23-24 include a Teacher Appreciation Week zine and an e-book with resources for using play to teach children collaboration, cooperation, and empathy.






